

Research Funding in New Zealand

- Cost of research is increasing rapidly
- Research funding is not keeping up
- Seriously limiting the number, focus and scale of research projects
- Leading to a loss of expertise researchers moving to other industries – researchers retiring and not being replaced
- Loss of confidence and momentum within the potato research community

Collaboration

- Australian Potato Research Program (APRP)
- An initiative between 5 different countries Australia, New Zealand, Canada, South Africa and the UK
- Single 5 year programme with different researchers working on different aspects of the programme
- From a grower investment of just under \$5M to a final project investment of \$30M
- How do we stimulate this level of collaboration in the future??
- NEED TO UNDERSTAND WHERE OTHER COUNTRIES ARE INVESTING IN RESEARCH

International Potato Research Collaborative Framework

- The IPP addresses the need to build collaboration and teamwork between researchers internationally and thence improve efficiency in research resource use.
- This initiative, in many ways, is a template for future, mission driven and industry guided, broadly collaborative co-investment in potato research.
- It aims to provide investors with a coordinated series of research activities, targeting their key R+D priorities, ensuring the highest probability of success.












Partnership agreement

- This is a direct outcome of the Dublin Declaration – for the development of global partnerships with the goal of addressing current and future challenges in global food security




IPP Website
